- 1. The gates will open at 4 PM Monday through Friday, and 1 PM on Saturday and Sunday.
- 2. NO AUTOMOBILES OR OTHER VEHICLES WILL BE ALLOWED TO SERVICE BOOTHS, EATING STANDS, SHOWS OR CONCESSIONS AFTER 2:00 PM ON TUESDAY, WEDNESDAY, THURSDAY AND FRIDAY, AND AFTER 11:00 AM ON SATURDAY AND SUNDAY. NO EXHIBITORS OR WORKERS' VEHICLE WILL BE ALLOWED INSIDE THE FAIRGROUNDS AFTER THE GATES OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. Any vehicle within the fairgrounds after the opening of the gates to the public will be towed at the owner's expense.
- All persons are requested to stay out of designated danger areas, as the fair will not be responsible for any accidents in these areas.
- 4. Vehicles of any type obstructing any passage or roadway on the fairgrounds shall be removed at the owner's expense. Any person(s) obstructing any passage or roadway on the fairgrounds will be asked to leave the fairgrounds or be subject to the penalty of a misdemeanor. The Columbus County Agricultural Fair Inc. is not responsible for double parking of vehicles on the fairground.
- No peddling, hawking, selling, or distributing material of any kind will be allowed, except from rented space assigned by the fair manager.
- No person will be permitted to remain on the grounds overnight, except those granted permission by the fair manager.
- 7. No illegal drugs or alcoholic beverages will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
- Drunkenness, quarreling or the use of profane or obscene language will not be permitted on the grounds. The fair reserves the right to expel any objectionable person(s) from the fairgrounds.
- Fireworks, petroleum, gunpowder, or any other dangerous or objectionable material will not be allowed on the grounds without permission.

GOLD SPONSOR (Minimum of \$8,000)

EXHIBITOR'S RULES

- Exhibitor's entries will be accepted for registration at the Exhibit Building on Friday from 12:00-4:00 PM and on Saturday before the fair, from 10:00 AM - 4:00 PM. No other entries will be accepted after 4:00 PM on Saturday. Judging will be done on Monday. Cakes will be accepted Monday at 9:00 AM.
- All articles must have been prepared, made or grown by the exhibitor WITHIN THE LAST TWELVE MONTHS.
- 3. All entries must be registered with the clerks in charge of registration at the Exhibit Building. All exhibits on display must remain in the Exhibit Building throughout the fair week. Articles may be reclaimed by the owner (ticket holder) following the fair on Monday, from 9:00 AM 5:00 PM. Any article removed from the Exhibit Building before Monday will forfeit any cash prize awarded to said article.
- 4. Exhibits will not be accepted by mail or public transportation.
- Exhibitors must see to the proper delivery of any article or livestock on the grounds and the proper care to the latter, as no charge for transportation of drayage will be paid by the fair.
- 6. All entries will be numbered and recorded in the book of entry of the proper department. Entry tags will be issued, bearing entry number and exhibit number tag to be attached to the exhibit and the stub retained by the exhibitor and presented on Monday when the exhibit it called for. These claim checks are your proof that you have entered all your exhibits as required. There will be one set of categories in which there may be a youth and adult entry. The designation "Y" will be added to the letter category for youth.
- Any and all articles judged by the registrar to be obnoxious or repulsive in character will be forbidden entry, or, if entered without being fully known, shall be removed at once.
- 8. The right is reserved to place an exhibit in its proper class if it has been incorrectly entered.
- 9. All entries should be for the first premium of the premium number, under which they are entered, but failing to take the first shall compete for the second, if the second is offered, but shall not be awarded more than one premium under the same number.
- 10. NO ARTICLE OR ANIMAL WILL BE ENTITLED TO SPACE UNTIL THE PROPER ENTRY HAS BEEN MADE. SPACE IS LIMITED. (All entries will be accepted in order of receipt until all available space is filled. In any case, all entries must be received by the date specified under each department and when all space is filled, the management reserves the right to refuse entries even if received before the specified date.
- 11. The management reserves the right to withhold premiums in any case in which it shall appear to them that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud has been practiced and anyone wanting to enter a complaint should do so in writing, no later than 12:00 noon on Tuesday.
- Should any person misrepresent his exhibit and a premium be awarded upon it, such premium may be withheld by the management.
- 13. PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS AWARDED Premiums will be paid by check at the end of the fair week. ALL CHECKS ARE VOID AFTER NOVEMBER 15. INDIVIDUALS ASSUME THE RESPONSIBILITY OF CLAIMING THEIR CHECKS AT THE EXHIBIT BUILDING BETWEEN 9:00 AM AND 5:00 PM ON MONDAY WHEN EXHIBITS ARE PICKED UP.
- All articles shall have been grown, made or prepared by the exhibitor unless otherwise specified in the rules.
- 15. All articles which are the product of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer. Those showing handiwork or skill must be entered in the name of the one whose skill they represent. Such may be individuals, firms or factories. Failure to comply with this rule will bar the violator from competing fro any premiums whatsoever and render him/her and his/her exhibit liable for expulsion from the grounds.
- 16. When an individual exhibit made from a farm wins first premium, an exhibit of the same kind from the same farm cannot win the second or third premium. Example: a farm is awarded first prize for corn. That same farm cannot win second or third prizes for corn (even if in a different name).
- 17. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each class, NO EXCEPTIONS.
- No person will be allowed to see the entries or to have access to the entry book until after the awards have been made.
- NOTICE THE FAIR ASSUMES NO RESPONSIBILITY IS CASES OF LOSS OR DAMAGE TO STOCK OR OTHER EXHIBITS FROM ANY CAUSE, AND UPON THIS CONDITION ONLY ARE ALL ENTRIES RECEIVED.
- A sweepstakes prize of \$100 will be awarded to the winner of the most Blue Ribbons, \$75 for second place,
 \$50 for third place and \$25 for fourth place.
- No exhibitors will be permitted inside the Exhibit Building during the judging and until the judging is completed.
- The standard system of awarding will be used with Blue, Red and White ribbons presented in each department.
- 23. Entries will be accepted of articles not listed in the premium list when, in the opinion of the registering official, such articles represent distinct classes suitable for exhibit within one of the departments of the fair. The fair reserves the right to reject any entry not considered suitable, whether of a class or not.
- 24. If available, space will be allotted for the exhibition of articles other than those listed in this catalog and if considered worthy for exhibition. All general rules apply. Ribbons may be awarded where merited, but these ribbons will not be considered in competition for "Most Blue Ribbons Won" in Adult or Youth Division.

INSIDE BOOTHS AND OUTSIDE SPACE RULES

- 1. All inside booths must be set up by 5:00 PM Monday, prior to opening of the fair. It will be the exhibitor's responsibility to have someone in the booth prior to the gates opening and until the fair closes each night. THE BOOTH SHOULD ALSO BE MANNED DURING SENIOR CITIZENS DAY on Friday opening at 1:00 PM. ALL BOOTHS MUST REMAIN IN PLACE UNTIL MONDAY FOLLOWING THE END OF THE FAIR AT 9:00 AM. NO EXCEPTIONS!! Booths will be judged Tuesday, the day the fair opens.
- 2. NO AUTOMOBILES OR OTHER VEHICLES WILL BE ALLOWED TO SERVICE BOOTHS, EATING STANDS, SHOWS OR CONCESSIONS AFTER 2:00 PM ON TUESDAY, WEDNESDAY, THURSDAY AND FRIDAY, AND AFTER 11:00 AM ON SATURDAY AND SUNDAY. NO EXHIBITORS OR WORKERS' VEHICLE WILL BE ALLOWED INSIDE THE FAIRGROUNDS AFTER THE GATES OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. ANY VEHICLE WITHIN THE FAIRGROUNDS AFTER THE OPENING OF THE GATES TO THE PUBLIC WILL BE TOWED AT THE OWNER'S EXPENSE.
- 3. The fair will assume no responsibility for fire, theft or damage to a vehicle during the time of the fair.
- 4. All persons are requested to stay out of designated danger areas, as the fair will not be responsible for any accidents in these areas. Any person(s) shall not obstruct any passage of roadway on the fairgrounds with an automobile or other vehicle. Should this occur, they will forthwith remove the vehicle or be subject to the penalty of a misdemeanor and expulsion from the grounds or have the vehicle towed at the owner's expense.
- 5. No person will be allowed to distribute any advertising or handbills on the fairgrounds or in any building or passageway except advertising which may be handed out from a rental space occupied by his or her exhibit, all subject to the approval of the fair manager. This also includes the peddling, hawking, selling or distributing of materials, which will not be allowed except from a rented space assigned by the fair manager. No person will be allowed to have a booth or distribute from the booth any and all articles that are obnoxious or repulsive in character. Should this occur, the person(s) will be forbidden entry or if already entered, without it being known, shall be removed at once.
- 6. No person will be permitted to remain on the grounds overnight, except those persons granted permission by the management. No person will be allowed to drive stakes, set up tents or dig holes into the ground of this fair without permission from the fair manager. Exhibitors will furnish all materials, tools and equipment for setting up their booth, except for a 110 volt electrical outlet which will be provided by the fair.
- No cooking of any kind will be allowed in any inside booth. All electrical outlets are provided for lighting, audio-visual equipment or cold storage. Only handmade candy, cold sandwiches, or nuts may be sold.
- Any changes in the rules, which right the fair board reserves, will be posted in the fair office and will supersede all earlier rules.
- Checks for commercial booths or outside space and a signed contract must be received before the exhibitor will be allowed to set up his or her area. The location of the exhibitor booth or outside space will be at the discretion of the fair board.
- 10. The fair will take responsible precaution to prevent the theft of articles in their rented booth. However, should theft or damage to articles or equipment happen due to wind, rain or power failure or other causes, the Columbus County Agriculture Fair assumes no responsibility.
- 11. Exhibitor passes will be issued during the set-up of the booth or outdoor space by the fair board. Only one pass per booth will be issued to school or educational booths. Two passes will be issued for each rented or sponsored booth. Additional passes, good for the week, may be purchased at the fair office prior to opening of the gates on the first night of the fair. Passes can be picked up in the office.

- 2. Individuals need to dress appropriately.
- 3. Holes may not be dug into the ground.
- 4. DISOUALIFICATIONS WILL RESULT FROM THE FOLLOWING:
 - A. SITTING ON THE GROUND OR ANY OTHER TEAMMATE
 - B. SHOULD A PERSON FALL OR LOSE BALANCE, THEY MUST RECOVER AT ONCE
 - c. A CAUTION AGAINST ONE PERSON IS A CAUTION AGAINST THE ENTIRE TEAM

> Our red cover and reproduction of the print by artist Larry Hewett is in celebration of the strawberry and its historical significance to Columbus County. Around 1862, Chadbourn resident Joseph Addison Brown, a local businessman, town official and member of the North Carolina Legislature planted his first field of strawberries located near Elm Street and present US 74 near Chadbourn. From 1895 until 1905, Chadbourn witnessed an agriculture and economic boom from the production of the strawberry with many hailing Chadbourn as the world's largest producer of strawberries. Over 350,000 crates of strawberries were produced in the growing season of 1905. Although the strawberry market officially closed in 1973, the town of Chadbourn and Columbus County celebrate the strawberry every year at the North Carolina Strawberry Festival in Chadbourn, North Carolina. The North Carolina Strawberry Festival is North Carolina's oldest Agriculture festival and will celebrate its 92nd vear in 2024.1
